I quilt to keep this special art form alive and meaningful today. When you asked me at the February Meeting what I mean by VINTAGE, honestly, it got me thinking. We're at a point where some of our members might be considered Vintage, Antique, Contemporary, or Modern—and I realized I want to be careful not to offend anyone. So, when I talk about our past, it's just that—the past. I won't put labels on it. I want to connect our current ideas and methods to the history that came before us. I love learning about the history behind quilting, and I see myself as a modern quilter. Bringing these two worlds together is part of what makes our quilting so unique.

CHALLENGE: With that in mind, I'd love to challenge all of us to think about our personal history, maybe a quilt in your closet or pieces from your grandmother or great-grandmother that you treasure. **Let's bring those quilts out into the light!** Can we create a new, modern quilt using those old ones as our starting point? Maybe a small quilt, a table runner, or a lap-sized quilt that connects your past with your present—that sounds like a fun challenge! Feel free to use traditional patterns like Four Patch, Ohio Star, Dresden Plate, Sunbonnet Sue, Sawtooth Star, Lemoyne Star, or Monkey Wrench, or **design something completely your own.**

February 2026 Kitsap Quilters Guild Minutes—Mary Jo Brisbon

President, Katherine Holtgraves, called the meeting to order at 6:01PM. The guild welcomed two visitors and two new members. Jackie Lewis and Meche Watne were also introduced as the evenings quilt holders.

Business of the Guild

The January general meeting minutes, as published in the February Newsletter, were unanimously approved on a motion by Leslie Stapleton and second by Betty Wing.

Jan Kohler gave the Treasurer's Report for January. Checking balance at the end of January was \$37,806.99. Savings balance was \$5,944.18. Preliminary quilt show figures indicate the show was a success. The front entry brought in \$9275, indicating we had over 900 in attendance. An income and expense report for the show will be presented at the March meeting.

Committee Reports

Raffle Quilt Ticket Sales: Mary Jo Brisbon thanked the team that designed, pieced and quilted the 2026 raffle quilt, "Water's Edge". She stated the quilt is so stunning, it literally has sold itself. She reported that we started with 3,000 tickets in August, and as of tonight's meeting, had 187 tickets remaining to be sold. Although sales were successful at other venues, the majority of sales have been to our members, who were thanked for their generosity and support of the program. Tickets will continue to be sold at general meetings until the drawing in May.

Programs, Anita Bernhard: Norma Stark will be returning to the guild for our May 26 program. She will also be leading a workshop on paper piecing on May 27 from 10-4 at the church. Anita displayed the beautiful sample of what the participants will be creating. Cost of the workshop is \$65 plus the cost of the templates, for a total of \$103. Please contact Anita to sign up.

2026 In-House Quilt: Members participating in this activity will be making 11.5 inch blocks out of solid white and bright fabrics. Each member can make 1 or 2 blocks, which will be due in April. For each block made, the member gets a chance to win the finished quilt. See the newsletter for instructions on the block.

President's Message, Katherine Holtgraves: The March program will be a vintage to contemporary challenge, put on by Katherine and Pam Whitt. Members are encouraged to bring in their vintage sewing machines (made prior to 1950) for display, with a stand up card describing the machine and what it means to them. If the machine is too cumbersome, you can bring in a photograph.

In the second part of her message, Katherine gave a huge thank you to all who helped make the show a huge success. She called upon Darlene Boggs and Gail Mann, who co-chaired the show, congratulating them for their "calmly, competent" leadership and asked them to describe their experience. Darlene said she was thrilled and pleased for such a great experience. Gail was impressed with the fact that so many families helped with the take down, citing the three

generations of the Johnson family, who promised to be back next year. Katherine then had the committee chairs stand up to be recognized.

Katherine thanked Marj Deupree, in charge of the website and the newsletter, for the getting the quilt show survey results posted to the website. 35% of the members completed the survey, 37% registered quilts in the show, and 58% are in favor of an annual show, indicating that we have a strong core of members dedicated to the show. Responses in the form of pie charts and a summary of comments will be posted to the website.

In order to have the show next year, someone needs to step up to be the Quilt Show Chair. Leslie Stapleton is also beginning to collect fat quarters for the bucket raffle

Quilt Sharing and Raffles: The quilt sharing was brief, due to the quilt show awards, but enjoyable.

Fat Quarter Lottery, Carolyn Nannery: The February lottery of pink/hearts was won by Mary Jo Brisbon. The theme for March is green/shamrocks.

Sherry’s Cozy Quilts Drawing, Sherry Schweizer: The winner of the \$15 gift card for completing the puzzle in Sherry’s newsletter ad was Pam Whitt.

Hospitality, Pam Whitt: This month’s them was “Back to the Quilt Show”. Lucky members received fantastic door prizes that were purchased from or donated by the vendors at this year’s show.

3rd Saturday Workshops—Audrey Fitzgerald

Debi Snyder will be guiding the **21 March** workshop through making a traditional string quilt. You may want to start saving your scraps (or “strings”) of differing lengths with widths varying from 3/4” to 2 ½”. You will need about 1 ½ to 2 yards of strings to make a lap quilt and about 1 ¾ yards of neutral or complementary yardage for the background. If you are interested in making a wall quilt, you will need ¾ yards for the background. The beauty of this quilt is it is a great way to burn through your scrap strips indiscriminately or create a quilt that you have gently nudged into a particular colorway or design.

On **18 April**, Jeannette Schanbeck will be showing us how to make a bag so big you can park a VW Bug in it (just kidding) while collapsing down so small it can store in something smaller than a shoe box (this part is true). It is truly a cavernous bag that can carry just about anything. The possibilities are really endless regarding what you would use it for. Warning though, it does everything but stand up on its own.

In May, we will be back to quilt making. Katherine Holtgraves is hosting the **16 May** offering and will be teaching puff quilt techniques. This style is visually appealing and encourages quilt snuggling if you are into that sort of thing. Puff quilts are great for pets and young ones, and the size of the block is very easy to adjust.

In person signups for workshops are in the church lobby during guild meetings. If you are not able to sign up for a workshop in person, please contact me to sign up Unless otherwise stated, the workshops run from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the church and there is a \$5.00 class fee. Supply lists will be emailed out a couple of weeks before the workshop to allow for the gathering of materials.

Please remember that workshops are led by quilters like you who have volunteered to share a project with their fellow guild members. If there is something that you enjoy doing or a favorite project that might be of interest to other sewers and you would like to share, please contact me. Also, fresh ideas for future workshops are always welcome.



Join the fun! This month we will be handing out instructions and a single 2.5 inch square for the 2026 In-House Quilt. You add solid white and bright fabrics. This year's block will finish at 11.5 inches, and you can make 1 or 2 blocks. Everyone who participates gets the opportunity to win the finished quilt. You will receive one entry ticket for each block you complete.

Completed blocks will be collected at the April meeting.

IN HOUSE QUILT BLOCK

CUT FABRICS:

White

- 2 - 2.5" x 9.5"
- 1 - 1.5" x 7.5"
- 1 - 1.5" x 6.5"

Bright Solid #1

- 1 - 6.5" Square

Bright Solid #2

- 1 - 2.5" x 9.5"
- 1 - 2.5" x 7.5"

Use Attached Blue 2.5" Square



ASSEMBLE BLOCKS

Measurements include 1/4" seam allowances. Sew with right sides together unless otherwise stated.

Press seams in directions indicated by arrows on diagrams. If no direction is specified, press seam toward darker fabric.

1. Gather a 6 1/2" square from one bright solid. From a different bright solid, gather a 2 1/2 x 9 1/2" rectangle and a 2 1/2 x 7 1/2" rectangle.
2. Sew a solid white 1 1/2 x 6 1/2" rectangle to left-hand edge of bright solid 6 1/2" square (Diagram 1). Add a solid white 1 1/2 x 7 1/2" rectangle to bottom edge.



3. Sew bright solid 2 1/2 x 7 1/2" rectangle to bottom edge of Step 2 unit (Diagram 2). Add bright solid 2 1/2 x 9 1/2" rectangle to left-hand edge.



4. Sew together a solid white 2 1/2 x 9 1/2" rectangle and a solid blue 2 1/2" square to make a pieced rectangle (Diagram 3).

5. Sew a solid white 2 1/2 x 9 1/2" rectangle to bottom edge of Step 3 unit (Diagram 4). Join pieced rectangle to left-hand edge to make a block. The block should be 11 1/2" square including seam allowances.




Curtains for Cat kennels at Kitsap Humane Society

Supplies:

Solid Color fabric cut to 20" X 40"

1/4" elastic cut to 25" and 2 buttons (each button about ½ to 1 inch in diameter)

Directions:

Hem the edges, with top edge for elastic sleeve.

Place one button at each side, approx. an inch from the edge.

Extend the elastic out 5 inches on each side. Fold it over so there is a 2.5 inch loop.

Securely sew the ends of the loop to the curtain edge.

The loop goes from back of kennel frame to front and loops over the button.



Quilting Tips for Newbies

- ⇒ **Accurate Cutting & Seaming:** Use a rotary cutter with a sharp blade and always cut away from your body. A consistent 1/4-inch seam is critical; use a specialized quilting foot to maintain this.
- ⇒ **Pressing Techniques:** Press, don't iron (lift and press, don't drag) to avoid warping fabric. Pressing seams open helps reduce bulk, especially for patchwork, though pressing to one side allows for better "nesting".
- ⇒ **Nesting Seams:** To align seams, press them in opposite directions on adjoining pieces so they "lock" together when pinned and sewn.
- ⇒ **Chain Piecing:** Feed pieces through the machine one after another without cutting the thread between them to save time and thread.




