Kitsap Quilters General Meeting Minutes, April 28, 2026

The meeting was called to order at 6:01 PM by President, Katherine Holtgraves. The guild welcomed five visiting guests, as well as members of the Sun Bonnet Sue Guild from Sequim, who were selling tickets for their beautiful raffle quilt.

Program, “From Inspiration to Quilt: The Photograph...Then the Quilt”, Elizabeth Barton

The guild welcomed Elizabeth Barton, from Athens, Georgia, for a special Zoom presentation exploring her creative process of expressing something she saw into a finished quilt. She starts with an inspirational photo, makes a simple sketch, eliminates what is not important, and brings out the bold lines and shapes by piecing and/or appliqueing the fabric with various stitching techniques. If not happy with the end result, she is not afraid to “throw it into a bucket of dye” or cut it up and rearrange it, advising all that one has to take risks. Her presentation was well received.

Business of the Guild

The meeting minutes from March 24, 2026, as published in the newsletter, were unanimously approved on a motion by Colleen Lane and a second by Kathy Beach. No Treasurer’s report was given.

Committee Reports

Members participating in the spring retreat raised \$300 for the Kitsap Humane Society. The thank you note the guild received will be posted in the newsletter. Katherine gave a special thank you to Sherry Schweizer for being a silent hero of the guild with her many contributions and support. The 2027 Raffle Quilt Committee was recognized for stepping up to the task and for reaching out to the entire guild to involve them in the creation of the raffle quilt. Anita Bernhard received a special thank you for her hard work on delivering a wide variety of interesting programs for the guild.

Quilt Show: Gail Mann will be the 2027 Quilt Show Chair and Candace Alvarez will be the Quilt Show Chair Elect. Gail provided an update of the progress they have made in preparation for the 2027 show – much has been accomplished already! Quilt Show dates are February 12 & 13, 2027, with set up on February 10 & 11. Most of the committee chair positions have been filled; however, there is still a need for committee chairs for Publicity, Vendors, and Volunteers. Please consider stepping up to fill these positions. Members voted by paper ballot for Featured Artist from the nominations of Val Martinson, Maureen Narimatsu, Barb Peterson, and Andrea Rudman.

Tools and Gadgets: Joyce Conbere and Luisana Sawyer will be chairing this committee. They have many exciting plans and will be demonstrating the various tools during break time. This evening's demonstration will be repeated at the May meeting due to lack of time.

2027 Raffle Quilt, Rachel Schweizer: The theme for the 2027 raffle quilt is a PNW Bookshelf. Members were encouraged to participate in the creation of the quilt by picking up a complete block kit that range from beginning skill level to intermediate. Completed blocks should be returned by the May 26 meeting. Any questions, please contact Rachel.

Pet Food Drive, Becky Holt: The guild is sponsoring a Spring Pet Food Drive to support our animal friends through Kitsap Humane Society and Fishline. Donations will be collected at the May 26th meeting. Members can participate by:

Follow up to March Program, Vintage Blocks, Katherine Holtgraves: Katherine was very excited about the blocks that have been turned in for this guild challenge. Participating members were given a bag containing vintage fabric and a pattern they could use if they chose to. Instructions were to make a 6.5 inch block, which will all come together in a quilt that will be raffled off at the July meeting to those participating in the challenge. Blocks need to be turned in at the May meeting.

President's Message, Katherine Holtgraves

Survey Results: Katherine thanked all that participated in the member feedback survey. 89/170 responses were received or 52.35%. Many insightful comments were made on the issues that will help the board and committees proceed on the issues.

88.4% were in favor of donating sewing machines to community groups. A new committee will be formed to pursue this initiative and they will present their plans to the board at the May board meeting.

51.2% were not in favor of purchasing an Accuguilt machine; however, the guild received a donation of a Go! Big Electric Fabric Cutter to be used instead. The Tool and Gadget committee will be responsible for this new tool.

40.5% were in favor of supporting pot lucks at our social events.

46.3% stated no preference in the timing of the social events, which will be left to the members planning the event.

Full survey results, including comments, were posted to the website on April 25, 2026.

She read through the many accomplishments and contributions Debi had made to the guild over the years. All members were asked to take a moment of silence, not only for Debi, but for someone in their lives that had passed. Show and Tell: Candance Alvarez and Susan McAllister were introduced as the evening's quilt holders. Beautiful quilts were displayed – we have such talented members!

Fat Quarter Lottery, Carolyn Nannery: Keitha Unger won tonight's lottery of gray/showers fat quarters. Next month the theme is yellow/flowers.

Hospitality, Pam Whitt: Not only do April showers bring May flowers, but they also bring Rainbows, which was the theme for tonight's door prize drawings. Ten lucky winners were able to select from charm packs and other prizes in all of the brilliant rainbow colors.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:14 PM.

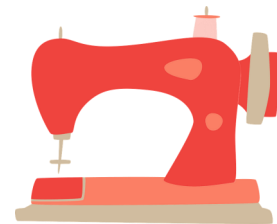

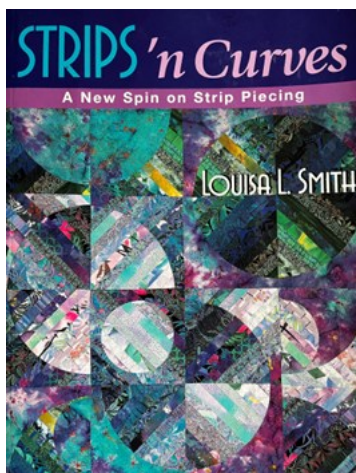

Tool of the Month—Joyce Conbere



Strips'n Curves – by Louisa L. Smith

In this kit, straight fabric strips are used to create simple shapes in eye-catching patterns that look like they move or have depth.

The strips can have different shades, colors, or prints. When placed next to each other, these small differences act like light and shadow in a painting. This makes the flat fabric look three-dimensional.

These patterns can show:

Movement or flow: The design can look like it's moving.

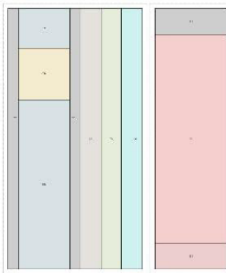
Light and dark contrast: Combining straight strips with curved seams—and placing light and dark fabrics next to each other—creates the illusion of depth.

The kit includes: four rulers and the book *Strips'n Curves*

INFORMATION ABOUT THE NEW PNW RAFFLE QUILT

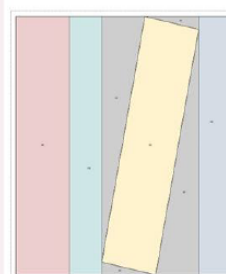
Thank you to everyone who has taken a kit to help us create the new PNW Raffle Quilt. We are so glad you are participating. It is a completely original design created by the team members. We'd like to address some frequently asked questions (FAQs):

- Your finished blocks should measure 10.5" x 12.5".
- The fabrics included with your kit (with the exception of the background, the cream Grunge) can be used in any order you wish.
- If you think your block will look too dark or too light, you can swap out some of the fabrics **as long as they adhere to our color scheme**: blue, green, browns, and gray. Please send a picture of your substitute fabric to Rachael at pnwquilting96@gmail.com for approval.
- If you are creating an applique block, feel free to embellish it as you wish. We ask that your embellishments are not too large.
- For the easy FPP block, the two pieces of the linear book block will be combined into one block on the A8 book edge. See image below.

Stitches In Time—Nancy Parrott

If we are lucky, we will meet at least one person in our lifetime who embodies traits of a Renaissance person. Someone who embraces the revival and exploration of the arts in all its forms. As members of this guild, we are surrounded by many who fall somewhere along this curve, but **Debi Snyder** stood out in her search for experiences and growth. There was nothing she would not attempt, and she always emerged as a master of the craft. Bravely, she met her last challenge on this earth on Easter Sunday and is now a part of a new universe of exploration.

She volunteered in all aspects of the guild from greeting people in membership, to organizing boutique sales, to keeping our finances in order as treasurers, to handling computerized registration of the quilt show, just to name a very few. Her charitable contributions to the community are equally impressive. Very quiet by nature, she tackled all manners of tasks and did them softly and efficiently.

There is no better way for us to understand her journey than by reading the bio she wrote to celebrate being chosen as the quilt show Featured Artist in 2024.

“Grandma, you’re going to be a great-grandma again – it’s time for you to make more quilts!

Oh well, I guess it’s time to sit down to design a new quilt and maybe a few stuffed animals. Wow, I don’t really think about what that means, because I have been designing my own quilts for over 40 years. When I started it was with graph paper, now it’s with EQ8 and Photoshop Elements.

I enjoy learning new techniques, but almost always fall back to scrappy quilts. The more fabrics used the better. When I started piecing tops, I was limited to what I had on hand, gathered here or there spending as little as I could. Now, as with most quilters, my love of fabric and my stash has grown slowly to what it is now – really can you ever have too much fabric! My daughter once counted that we had made over 5 queen-size quilts, including binding and backing, from just what I had in my stash. That was 9 years ago when she was helping reduce it. And my stash has grown since.

What is my inspiration? If I see something that speaks to me, that challenges me and has a use in my life (even if it’s only decorative), then it’s time to create it. If it’s a pattern - great. If it’s easily accessible - even better. But if not, I design it. If it’s a craft I haven’t attempted before, then I learn by reading everything I can. I can’t remember when it hasn’t been that way. That is how I have taught myself to crochet, knit, quilt, longarm quilting, brew beer, make champagne, ceramics, cross-stitch, ...etc.

I believe that the quilting is as much a part of the design process as the pattern and fabric choices. That is the reason I bought a long-arm. I have a bare-bones machine with a QBOT, nothing fancy. I have designed my own computerized quilting patterns. Custom quilting is what I gravitate towards for most quilts, ruler work and free motion. Quilting makes a difference, adding texture to even the plainest quilts.

Every part of quilting is playtime. If it isn’t fun or a challenge, then it’s time to move on.”

Among the MANY awards and ribbons she received, two are highlighted here to show the breadth of her work. Debi was a true master of her craft, and she will live on through her extraordinary work and charitable deeds. Debi, you are and will forever be missed.

I hand dyed most of the silk ribbon I used in the silk embroidery being limited to

what I had on hand during the pandemic. There is another Piecemaker's calendar quilt hiding in my UFO bin at this time waiting for the embroidery to be done, except for the embroidery it will be all machine done.

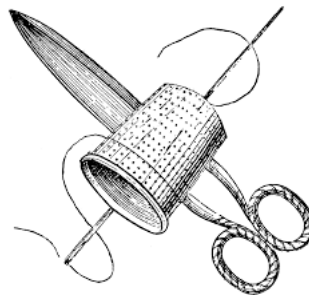
