July 2026 Kitsap Quilters Guild Minutes—Mary Jo Brisbon

The meeting was called to order at 6:01 PM by President, Katherine Holtgraves. The guild welcomed five visitors.

Business of the Guild

The meeting minutes from June 23, 2026, as published in the newsletter, were unanimously approved. Jan Kohler provided the monthly Treasurer's Report. The checking balance as of June 30, 2026 was \$43,945.54 and the savings balance was \$5,945.65. In review of the proposed budget for 2026-2027, she explained that 45% of the guild's income comes from membership, 30% from the quilt show, 20% from raffle quilt ticket sales, and the rest from other committees. The guild's primary expenses are 35% for administrative and 40% to program/education. The proposed budget is posted on the website and members are encouraged to review the budget prior to the approval vote at the September meeting.

2026-2027 Slate of Officers: The slate of officers for next year was unanimously approved on a motion by Jan Kohler and a second by Lynn McDonough. Congratulations and thank you to our new officers!

2026-2027 Raffle Quilt: The raffle quilt, *PNW Pages*, was unveiled by Rachel and Sherry Schweitzer, to a round of applause by those in attendance. They received 72 of the 80 prepared block kits back from the guild members, and 42 blocks were used in the quilt. Pam Whitt did the beautiful quilting. The raffle quilt committee was recognized for its efforts in designing and piecing the quilt. Rachel stated it was a learning experience requiring a lot of patience and outstanding cooperation from the guild. A Raffle Quilt Ticket Sales Committee is needed to make sure that *PNW Pages* finds a good home, so please consider stepping up and taking this task on.

Vintage Program Follow-Up: Back in March, the program was about vintage quilts and the President's Challenge was for members to make 6.5 inch blocks from vintage fabrics. Many of those blocks were pieced into a beautiful quilt and the rest of the blocks came together into a kit to make another quilt, complete with batting and backing. Those participating in the challenge were eligible to win the vintage quilt, the kit, or a book. Claire Grantham won the beautiful quilt. Susi Gaskins won the complete kit, and Katherine Zimmerman won the coffee table book on quilts. Thanks to Katherine Holtgraves and Pam Whitt for this amazing challenge!

Visitors and Community Opportunities: Three community organizations visited the guild to share their mission and accomplishments.

Jessie, from the Kitsap Humane Society, brought little kitten Napoleon and his sister. Surprised they weren't adopted on the spot! She shared that the Humane Society offers adoptions and rescues. Last year, over 3,000 adoptions occurred. Make sure you license your pet with the Humane Society because if it is lost and found, the Humane Society will be the taxi that returns your pet to you. They also offer veterinary life-saving services to low-income households. Jessie thanked the guild for its support with the spring retreat monetary donation and through the recent pet food drive.

Sandy, from Quilts of Valor, shared that they meet at Quilted Strait the first Monday of each month. They make quilts for our veterans and make a presentation to a vet each month. In the last two years they have made over 250 quilts. She reached out to guild members for help in quilting the tops since two of their long armers are currently not able to. Please contact her if you are able to help.

Barb Seitz represented Linus Project, who make blankets for children in distress for various reasons. The proceeds from their raffle quilt sales go to the purchase of fabric, batting and yarn. In 2024, they had over 600 blankets; in 2025 that increased to 1,000. They meet the last Sunday of each month at St. Anthony's Episcopal Church near Bangor. If you would like to donate quilts to the project, the best contact is through Facebook or contact Barb directly. Quality Sewing, Quilted Strait, and Sherry's Cozy Quilts are also drop off points for donated quilts.

Sharing: Darlene Boggs and Jan Kohler were tonight's show and tell quilt holders. Many beautiful quilts were shared.

Program, Josephine de la Cruz Keasler, Trunk Show: Josephine is a certified Judy Neimeyer instructor, as well as a certified instructor for many other renowned quilters. She has instructed at the Empty Spools Seminars for many years. Josephine has exceptional skills in all areas of quilting including design, piecing techniques, and border options. She has an excellent awareness of color theory as evidenced by the many color options of her work displayed in her slide trunk show. Her presentation was truly inspirational.

Fat Quarter Lottery, Carolyn Nannery: The winner of the red/blue/4th of July fat quarter lottery was Keitha Unger. There will be no lottery in August due to the ice cream social. September's theme is orange/foilage.

Hospitality, Pam Whitt: Tonight's theme was Christmas in July. Eight lucky winners received Christmas decorated bags containing materials for themed kits and projects.

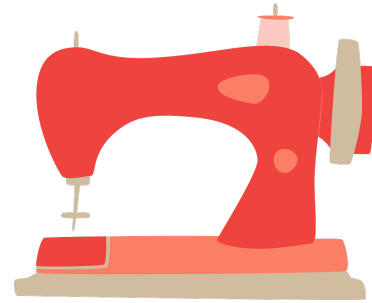

QUILT YOUR STORY

CRITERIA

- Quilt your story. Make blocks that represent things in your life that tell your story! Books, animals, quilting, travel, etc.
- Finished Blocks can be up to 8-1/2" wide
- Your top block should have a sleeve to hold a 1/4" dowel. This is the preferred method of hanging.
- Length of **finished** "story" can be no longer than 48". This is from dowel to bottom of last block
- Your story needs to be completed by the January 25, 2027 meeting. Guild member voting will take place at this meeting.

The Christmas block exchange 4.0

For our new guild members, it's been a tradition to exchange holiday blocks at our Christmas Potluck dinner in December.

You can start shopping now for some holiday fabric and a fun 12.5" block pattern. You will need to make 6 of the same block and 7 if you want one for yourself.

Register to participate in the block exchange at the September, October, or November meetings and receive an assortment of fun blocks in December.

The rules to participate are as follows:

- No blocks on point
- No 4 or 9 patch blocks
- No panels with a border added
- Must be 100% cotton fabric with the exception of embellishments
- Blocks must be 12.5 inches including the seam allowance
- Flannel, felt or wool may only be used for embellishment, which you are free to use, but please attach by sewing
- All appliqued pieces must be sewn down
- Put your name on a back seam allowance of each of the 6 blocks
- You may make two sets of blocks, but no more than 12 blocks will be accepted

Any blocks not following the rules will be returned to the maker. Place the blocks in a Ziplock bag labeled with your name. Blocks will be accepted until the November meeting. Your bag will be returned to you at the Christmas party with 6 fun blocks done by your guild buddies. If you cannot attend the party, we will bring your blocks to the January meeting.

Stitches In Time—Nancy Parrott

Keeping Current.

Curiosity has gotten the better of me. For months I have been hearing the pros and cons of Artificial Intelligence (AI), so I decided to gather my own data.

First, I loaded ChatGPT onto my iPad from the App Store at no cost. Then I ask ChatGPT to write a paragraph explaining what AI and ChatGPT is so we can all have the same starting place. This is what it said:

Artificial intelligence (AI) is a branch of computer science that enables computers to perform tasks that normally require human intelligence, such as recognizing patterns, understanding language, solving problems, and generating new ideas. ChatGPT is an AI language model that has been trained on vast amounts of text to understand questions and produce natural, conversational responses. Rather than searching the internet like a search engine, ChatGPT predicts the most likely and useful response based on what it has learned during training and, when appropriate, can also use current online information. It is a versatile tool that can help with writing, learning, planning, research, and creative projects, making it a valuable assistant for both everyday tasks and lifelong learning.

Then I ask it to write an article for quilters about quilting fabrics and give a one sentence description of each one. It gave me this in about 10 seconds.

A Guide to Common Quilting Fabrics

The fabric you choose has as much impact on a quilt as the pattern or stitching. While hundreds of textiles are available, experienced quilters tend to rely on a core selection of fabrics, each offering unique characteristics for piecing, appliqué, borders, backing, or embellishment. Understanding this incredible variety of quilting fabrics, each created using different dyeing, printing, or weaving techniques that affect both appearance and performance helps quilters choose the right material to achieve the desired look, texture, and visual impact in their quilts.

Quilting Cotton

The industry standard for quilt tops, quilting cotton is a tightly woven, 100% cotton fabric that provides excellent stability, accurate cutting, and minimal stretching.

Batik Cotton

Batik fabric is hand-dyed using a wax-resist process, creating rich, saturated colors on a dense cotton fabric that frays less than traditional quilting cotton.

Shot Cotton

Shot cotton is woven with different colored warp and weft threads, producing a subtle iridescent appearance that adds depth without overwhelming a quilt design.

Homespun Cotton

Homespun cotton features a loose weave with colored threads woven into plaids or stripes, giving quilts a soft, rustic, country-inspired look.

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Stitches In Time—Continued

Solid Cotton

Solid quilting cotton offers a single, consistent color that highlights piecing, quilting designs, and color relationships without the distraction of prints.

Tone-on-Tone Prints

Tone-on-tone fabrics use slightly different shades of the same color to create texture while functioning almost like solids in a quilt.

Reproduction Fabrics

Reproduction fabrics faithfully recreate prints and colors from historical eras, making them ideal for traditional and period-inspired quilts.

Novelty Prints

Novelty fabrics feature themed illustrations, characters, or motifs that add personality and playful storytelling to quilts.

Flannel

Cotton flannel has a softly brushed surface that provides extra warmth and coziness for quilts intended for cold weather.

Lawn Cotton

Cotton lawn is a lightweight, finely woven fabric with a silky feel that works beautifully for delicate quilts and lightweight projects.

Linen

Linen contributes natural texture and elegance to quilts while softening with age, though it wrinkles more readily than cotton.

Linen-Cotton Blends

Linen-cotton blends combine the texture of linen with the stability of cotton, making them easier to piece than pure linen.

Chambray

Chambray is a lightweight woven fabric with colored warp threads and white weft threads that gives quilts a soft, denim-like appearance.

Denim

Lightweight denim adds durability and striking texture to quilts, although its heavier weight requires thoughtful planning.

Canvas

Cotton canvas provides exceptional strength for utility quilts, bags, and home décor projects where durability is a priority.

Muslin

Muslin is an inexpensive plain-weave cotton commonly used for quilt backings, foundations, mock-ups, and practice blocks.

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Stitches In Time—Continued

Wide-Back Cotton

Wide-back fabric is extra-wide quilting cotton that allows large quilt backs to be made with few or no seams.

Voile

Cotton voile is exceptionally lightweight and soft, making it well suited for airy summer quilts and modern quilt designs.

Wool

Wool provides warmth, loft, and dimension, making it especially popular for appliqué, penny rugs, and decorative quilt accents.

Wool Felt

Wool felt does not fray when cut, making it an excellent choice for appliqué pieces with intricate shapes.

Silk

Silk lends luxurious sheen and elegance to quilts but requires careful handling because of its delicate nature.

Velvet

Velvet introduces rich texture and depth, although its nap and stretch make it better suited for accent pieces than intricate piecing.

Cuddle Fabric

Cuddle fabric is an ultra-soft polyester plush often used for quilt backs to create exceptionally warm and comforting quilts.

Minky

Minky is a plush microfiber fabric that produces irresistibly soft quilt backs, though its stretch requires careful sewing techniques.

Hand-Dyed Fabrics

Hand-dyed fabrics are individually dyed by artisans, producing one-of-a-kind color variations, subtle shading, and artistic depth that cannot be replicated commercially.

Screen Prints

Screen-printed fabrics are created by applying each color separately through fine mesh screens, resulting in crisp, vibrant designs with excellent color saturation.

Digital Prints

Digital printing uses inkjet technology to reproduce highly detailed artwork, realistic imagery, and unlimited color palettes directly onto fabric.

Yarn-Dyed Fabrics

Yarn-dyed fabrics are woven from threads that are dyed before weaving, creating plaids, stripes, checks, and subtle color effects with exceptional depth.

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Stitches In Time—Continued

Ombre Fabrics

Ombre fabrics feature a smooth transition from one color or value to another, making them ideal for creating movement and gradient effects in quilts.

Blender Fabrics

Blenders are low-volume prints designed to bridge the gap between busy prints and solids, adding texture without competing for attention.

Low-Volume Prints

Low-volume fabrics feature soft, lightly printed backgrounds that add interest while maintaining a clean, airy appearance.

Conversation Prints

Conversation prints feature larger-scale images or scenes that invite closer inspection and often become focal points within a quilt.

Floral Prints

Floral fabrics range from delicate botanicals to bold garden-inspired designs and remain one of the most enduring categories in quilting.

Geometric Prints

Geometric fabrics use repeating shapes, lines, and modern motifs to add structure, rhythm, and contemporary style to quilt designs.

Text Prints

Text prints incorporate words, typography, sheet music, maps, or script to provide visual interest and meaningful design elements.

Marbled Prints

Marbled fabrics mimic the flowing movement of hand-marbled paper with swirling blends of multiple colors.

Watercolor Prints

Watercolor prints imitate the soft edges and blended hues of painted artwork, creating gentle transitions and painterly effects.

Mottled Prints

Mottled fabrics contain irregular variations in color that create texture and dimension without a distinct printed motif.

Grunge Fabrics

Grunge fabrics combine a solid background with distressed textures and layered markings that add visual depth while reading as nearly solid.

Metallic Prints

Metallic fabrics incorporate gold, silver, copper, or other metallic inks to add shimmer and highlight selected portions of a design.

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Stitches In Time—Continued

Pearlized Prints

Pearlized fabrics use iridescent inks that produce a soft, luminous sheen rather than the brighter sparkle of metallic printing.

Discharge Prints

Discharge printing removes dye from previously dyed fabric to reveal lighter designs with an exceptionally soft hand.

Resist-Dyed Fabrics

Resist-dyed fabrics use materials such as wax, paste, or stitching to prevent dye from reaching selected areas, creating intricate patterns and color contrasts.

Shibori Fabrics

Inspired by traditional Japanese dyeing techniques, shibori fabrics feature organic folded, stitched, or bound resist patterns with dramatic visual texture.

Indigo-Dyed Fabrics

Indigo-dyed fabrics are colored with deep blue indigo dye, often displaying beautiful tonal variations that become richer with age.

Designer Collections

Designer collections consist of coordinated prints, colors, and scales developed to work together, making it easy to create balanced and visually cohesive quilts.

Precuts

Jelly Rolls, Charm Packs, Layer Cakes, Mini Charm Packs, and Fat Quarter bundles provide coordinated fabrics in standardized sizes that simplify quilt planning and reduce cutting time.

Whether creating heirloom quilts, modern masterpieces, or everyday bed quilts, selecting the appropriate fabric for each purpose enhances both the appearance and durability of the finished project. A well-stocked fabric collection containing a variety of these materials allows experienced quilters to confidently tackle virtually any quilting style or technique. Combining a variety of printing, dyeing, and weaving techniques adds richness, texture, and visual complexity that can transform a beautiful quilt into an extraordinary one.

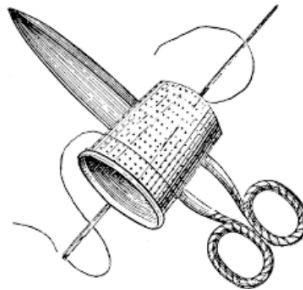
