



President's Message — Continued

And finally, we are looking at increasing Raffle per ticket prices from from \$1.00 to \$2.00, 5 tickets for \$10.00. This change will help the guild in two ways:

- 1. It will help us to reach our goal of \$5,000, which is 2500 tickets sold, and
- 2. it lowers the price that we spend on tickets.

Currently we spend \$318.70 for 5000 tickets and the change drops the cost to \$199.98 for 2500 tickets. Volunteers will travel less and use less gas when visiting other guilds, store fronts, trying to sell tickets. Other guilds have changed the price of their tickets to \$2.00. For instance, Sun Bonnet Sue, Bainbridge Modern, Cabin Fever Quilters just to name few here close by. Sarah Lewis and Lisa Jette are working very hard and are very close to being sold out, which hasn't been done in over 4 years. We will be taking vote on making this increase or not at our May meeting.

3rd Saturday Workshop—Audrey Fitzgerald

On 18 May you will have an opportunity to make a large carry all tote with wooden handles. This was identified as the favorite project in the past Monthly Mystery survey. Sample bags are on the Education table in the lobby. This tote really is a workhorse, is quick to make, can be adapted to just about any size (I have actually seen a quilter use a larger tote to carry her sewing machine to a sewing event) and it is easy to embellish with quilting, outside pockets or a stiff interfacing to make it a sturdy, stand up bag. Jeannette Schanbeck will be heading up this workshop.

The workshops run from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the church and there is a \$5.00 class fee. Celebrating our Favorite Quilts

Part 2

Kitsap Quilters has so many amazing members that we cannot highlight them all in one newsletter. Pictures get our attention, but often the story is completed by reading about the inspiration and process that goes into a quilt. Below you will find the second group of five viewer's choice winners from the February quilt show. Enjoy.... and Congratulations to all!

Linda Moran 6th Place Three Way Tie

Misted Pines Quilt 88 x 110 inches

I have been in the Guild for about 17 years or so...time flies! I made the quilt for one of my daughters, in honor of her graduation from law school. She mentioned a Pacific Northwest feel to her quilt and when I showed her a picture of the pattern, with its trees and mountains, it was exactly what she had in mind. (Whew! But what is it really going to look like when I finish it?!) I bought the kit, which included 12 shades of Stonehenge fabrics.

This was likely the most difficult quilt I've ever encountered. It really required complete focus as far as the cutting. For the most part, the trees were pretty easy, but keeping focused on the angles to cut the mountains, and a dozen slightly varying shades of the Stonehenge fabrics, it required complete concentration (and being home alone!), as



well as careful labeling of the fabrics. I started the quilt in spring of '23, set it aside for a while, and finished it in March of this year.

Would I make this quilt again? Maybe, and not likely the queen size...the throw is more manageable, and it really IS very pretty with all the variations in shades.



Diane Lavang 6th Place Three Way Tie

Bird Dance

When I first saw the Bird Dance quilt pattern I was intrigued. Then when the classes were offered at Quilted Strait, I was all in. I've always loved doing handwork and was excited to make my own rendition. I decided to layer my wool birds onto a linen background so I could more heavily quilt around the birds to make them pop. Embellishing the bird blocks and creating my own border was the most fun. Since I do not have a longarm machine I decided to use the quilt -as-you-go method. I joined Kitsap Quilters about 28 years ago and have been quilting for almost 30 years.

6th Place Three Way Tie

Quilted Mandela

This quilted mandala was done as part of a quilt along with Angela Walters. I really wanted to practice free motion

quilting on my long arm and didn't want to practice on just a blank piece. I needed some structure. The fun thing was that I did the quilting design motifs as they came to my mind. I was able to use arc rulers and practice how to set-off a piece by making sections. My confidence was really boosted. I particularly love doing a McTavish pattern in the outside of the mandala that uses the small, elongated curves with arcs filling in. This has now become my favorite motif. Most satisfying part of this project was developing the motion memory to quilt certain patterns now that come so much easier. I'm willing to keep going without judging every swirl. My circles are rounder, by curves easier. I loved the process of pure quilting.

Japanese Cranes



When I was about eight years old, my mom taught me how to sew. My younger years were spent working in fabric stores, making clothing for my family, and altering clothing for additional income. I started quilting in 2002 when my friend Linda Morton (also a guild member), brought an "I Spy" quilt to work to "show and tell". Linda shared the pattern and template with me. After I made the "I Spy" quilt for my 2-year-old nephew, I was hooked on quilting. Currently, I occasionally sew a few clothing items for my grandchildren, but quilting is now my hobby. I enjoy learning new techniques, tips, tricks, and knowledge from other quilters to become a better quilter and long-armer. I joined Kitsap Quilters in 2023.



I started this quilt in 2015 while living in Japan. I was inspired by all the origami paper cranes. In Japan, the crane is a symbol of good fortune and longevity. I paper-pieced the cranes from a pattern found on Pinterest and wanted to use the blue and white embroidered designs that I purchased from a guild show sale or garage sale with them. I placed them on the design wall (flannel backed tablecloth) and came up with this design. The back of the quilt is pieced with a Japanese furoshiki wrapping cloth and fabric from my stash that had origami cranes on it. The top and backing were both completed in 2017 in Japan, but I didn't have my longarm with me to finish it. So, it sat in my "to be quilted" pile until

this year. I did ruler work, stencils, and free motion quilting.

Becky Rico 8th Place Ribbon

Crystal Star

I am a longtime fan of Edyta Sitar of Laundry Basket Quilts. Last year when I found the kit in our show boutique for this Crystal Star including all the pre-cut appliqué pieces, I knew I had to make this quilt. Deciding how to quilt it was the biggest challenge for me.


